Healthy Church Initiative Update

CONSULTATION WEEKEND MARCH 1st, 2nd, 3rd

The Weekend of March the 1,2,3rd will be an opportunity for our church to more fully engage in the Healthy Church Initiative a process that we have been involved in since September of 2012.

We will have team of three consultants come and interview our staff and members of our congregation to get their input on the direction our church needs to go in the future. This team has reviewed our Self-Study documents which we sent to them in January. This is a seventy –four page packet that covers everything from our ten year giving trends to our interviews with community leaders, to how many parking spaces we have in the parking lot.

What is One Great Hour of

Sharing?

One Great Hour of Sharing is one of the six church-wide Special Sundays with offerings of The United Methodist Church. One Great Hour of Sharing enables the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) to live out its mission to alleviate human suffering. UMCOR responds to natural or human made disasters - those interruptions of such magnitude that they overwhelm a community's ability to recover on its own.

When is One Great Hour of Sharing celebrated?

One Great Hour of Sharing is celebrated on the fourth Sunday in Lent. This is also the third Sunday before Easter.

Are One Great Hour of Sharing-funded ministries limited to the United States? To other countries?

The One Great Hour of Sharing offering makes ministries available in the United State and across the globe. The need for food, shelter, health and peace knows no continental boundaries.

What is UMCOR? What types of outreach are included in the OGHS offering?

UMCOR is humanitarian arm of The United Methodist Church. OGHS gifts underwrite UMCOR's "costs of doing business." That means every penny of every gift you make to a specific UMCOR project will be spent on that project—not on home office administrative costs.

Offering gifts over and above those used to cover administrative costs are channeled where they're most needed. UMCOR's specialized ministries—responding in disaster, fighting hunger, alleviating poverty, providing relief supplies around the world, and offering hospitality to immigrants and refugees—assist the most vulnerable people whose need is greatest.

UMCOR receives no World Service funds or any other apportionments. Your gifts mean we're right there with hardworking families, people affected by storms or war, disaster or disease. Self-sufficiency is the goal.

Through OGHS, we share the goodness of life with those who hurt:

- On the Gulf Coast of the United States, where Hurricane Katrina and other storms devastated families from Florida to Texas:
- In Sudan, where hardworking families persist despite war and displacement;
- In Sierra Leone, where we're fighting the spread of malaria; and
- In Georgia, Eastern Europe, where a cold winter tests endurance.

In 81 countries in all, you assure your church is in the lead to alleviate suffering through One Great Hour of Sharing.

Does any of our offering pay for administrative costs?

The One Great Hour of Sharing offering supports the administrative costs that underwrite the United Methodist Committee on Relief. This means that by giving faithfully to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering, all contributions to UMCOR go to the specific project and not administrative costs.

What exactly will One Great Hour of Sharing offering go to?

One Great Hour of Sharing makes all of the other United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) programs possible. The One Great Hour of Sharing offering funds the cost of doing business for UMCOR. Any gifts that are over and above UMCOR's administrative costs go to where they are most needed. Often they support underfunded programs.

How much was given to One Great Hour of Sharing in the last 3 years?

In 2011 2,947,642 was remitted, in 2010, \$2,695,885 was remitted and in 2009, \$3,111,349 was remitted.

Nurse's Notes:

<u>"Talking With Your Care Provider"</u>

Talking with your care provider means sharing information about how you feel physically, emotionally, and mentally.

Think about what brought you to the clinic. The more information you can tell your care provider, the easier it will be for he or she to diagnose what the problem is.

Know Your symptoms:

- · What are they?
- How long have you had them?
- Do they come and go or are they constant?
- Do they keep you up at night?
- What makes them better or worse?
- What have you tried at home?
- Can you carry on your daily activities?
- On a scale of 1 to 10 how bad is the pain?

Use your Time Wisely:

- Be honest: To not tell the truth about a problem never helps. If you should drink or use illegal drugs, you may not really think your symptoms are related to these issues. Such as alcohol use associated with depression. If you use left over pain killers before your visit, you won't react in the same way on a physical exam.
- Stick to the most important reasons for being at the clinic. Schedule another appointment to talk about other concerns.
- Get all your questions answered. Make a list before arriving.
- If you don't understand something, ask to have it explained.
- Be a partner with your care provider in caring for yourself. Be assertive about options and second opinions. Follow through with recommendations.

- If financial costs are a concern, say so. Other prescriptions or treatments may be available.
- Be generous and appreciative-taking care of people day in and day out is a hard job.
 Remember your care provider is human too.

Unlike a Medical Visit:

Jesus and you have a unique relationship. He knows your every need, thought, and ailment. "What a friend we have in Jesus." Just go to him and spill out your concerns. He's there to listen and comfort you always: today, tomorrow, and till the end of time.

Make cleaning buckets:

Bishop Bruce Ough is challenging Minnesota UMs to prepare a record number of cleaning buckets by annual conference session (May 29 -31). The sheer numbers of relief supply kits that the UM Committee on Relief delivers annually is evidence of a caring, connected UMC that is determined to deliver relief at the crucial hour of need. In 2012, the UMCOR Relief-Supply Network shipped more than \$6 million worth of goods and materials to people in

need worldwide.

Cleaning Bucket

Value: \$55.00

5 gallon bucket with resalable lid

Buckets from fast food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned.

Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner.

Advertisements on the outside are acceptable.

liquid laundry detergent

two 25 oz. or one 50 oz. bottles only

liquid household cleaner

12-16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water no spray cleaners

dish soap

16-28 oz bottle any brand

1 can air freshener

aerosol or pump

1 insect repellant spray

6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover

1 scrub brush

no toilet-bowl brushes
plastic or wooden handle
no kitchen or dish brushes

18 cleaning wipes

handi wipes or reusable wipes no terry cleaning towels remove from packaging

7 sponges

remove from wrapper no cellulose sponges due to mold issue

5 scouring pads

remove from wrapper no Brillo, SOS pads or any kind that will rust

50 clothespins

remove from packaging

clothes line

two 50 ft. or one 100 ft. cotton or plastic.

24 roll heavy duty trash bags

remove from the box 30-45 gallon size

5 dust masks

2 pair disposable waterproof gloves

rubber or latex remove from packaging

1 pair work gloves

cotton or leather

leather palms necessary

Assembling Directions for Cleaning Buckets:

Place all liquid items in the bucket first. Place remaining items in the bucket fitting them around and between the liquid

items. Sponges, scouring pads, clothespins and trash bags can be separated in order to fit all of the items in the bucket.

Ensure the lid is closed securely.

Important Notes

- All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. No powders please.
- If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. Including larger sizes of any item will prevent the lid from sealing.
- UPS, FED EX and the US Postal Service will not ship buckets containing bleach. In such case, you may leave the bleach out of the bucket.
- If all of the items on the list are not included, please put a label on the bucket indicating what has been omitted.
- Cleaning buckets are only used within the United States. They are not opened to verify the contents unless there is indication some items have been omitted.

Packing Kits

Box Weight

Each packed box cannot exceed 66 pounds.

Shipping Kits

- 1. Complete 2 packing lists-one for your records and one to put on the shipping box.
- 2. Paste the shipping label / packing list on the outside of each box you send. The shipping list helps the depot to quickly process kits.
- 3. **Processing & Shipping Costs**: Please enclose an envelope containing at least \$1 for each kit you send. This donation enables kits to be sent to areas in need. For Cleaning Buckets: \$1.50.

Jesus Seeds Update:

Let me remind you that there is a bowl of Jesus seeds by the bulletin board in the hallway. These are for all of us to take as a reminder that Jesus is with us always and to give (or sow) to others that we think need that reminder, too. The seeds are different than the other symbols of Jesus that we may carry, because they are meant to be given away!

The good news is that approximately 200 Jesus seeds have been taken! The Farmer Rog in me wants to tell you how to sow the seeds. But the Christian Rog knows that Jesus' 'Parable of the Sower' will hold true and many of the seeds will be sown in unfertile soil and not bear fruit. But some of the seeds will find the fertile soil of someone who desperately needs to be reminded of Jesus' presence. It's just like fishing. Many casts are needed to catch the fish!

So now it's up to you to sow the Jesus seeds. There are many in our congregation, and each of us is connected in our daily lives with someone who could benefit by knowing of Jesus' presence. Let's take Jesus from 'Faith by The Lake, and Beyond'!!

As you sow, I invite all of you who are willing, to share your experiences of sowing the Jesus seeds, either in writing, or at the church service. Or you can tell Pastor Victor or me and we will tell your story for you. One Jesus seed that I gave away was to a Marine that needed directions to the Congregational Church. Instead of telling him, I said 'follow me'. We didn't know each other, but when we got there, I told him I wanted him to carry the Jesus seed in his pocket and thanked him for his service. You really don't need to say much, when you sow. A seed with Jesus' name on it is explanation enough.

If you have been moved in discipleship by sharing the Jesus seeds, I invite you to contribute to the cost of keeping the bowl full. Each seed costs \$0.75. You can donate to the project by listing Jesus Seeds on your giving envelope. Let's keep this project going and pray that many fertile souls are touched by it!
