I would like to say "THANK YOU" to my church family for your thoughts of concerns, cards, prayers and telephone calls regarding my recent fall. The power of prayer is a powerful tool. You will never know how much they have meant to me and my family.

I'm currently at Rochester Gemrose building, part of St. Mary's Hospital and receiving daily therapy, both operational and physical therapy, six and sometimes seven days weekly. If that isn't enough, when David comes over in the evening we do another several hours of therapy in my room. Everyone we have come in contact with has been great, patient and willing to answer all our questions and make sure we understand each step along the way.

The plan is at the end of April, I will be transferred up to Courage Center in Golden Valley, to their spinal cord center for specialized therapy to start walking and getting more movement in my body.

Today I can move my ankles, toes and elbows and with limited movement of my fingers. With each day I can see improvements and that is what keeps me going, along with the outside support I receive.

Those two little words "Thank You" doesn't seem to be appropriate for all that our family received, but this all I can offer. Can't wait to get back to church and see everyone again. Thanks again and God Bless.

Ruth Circle

Roberta presented the program: 'What the Cross Means to Me'. It started with the ladies singing, The Old Rugged Cross'.

The program consisted of sharing thoughts about the Cross being a symbol of what Jesus did for us. The ladies shared thoughts about what the cross means to them. Some shared thoughts about a Bible camp they attended (Camp Frontenac) and remembering a cross that was there that was similar to the cross we have at Faith.

Drapes on the Cross

Ruth circle reviewed the meanings of the drapes on the cross at Faith and thought it may be of interest to others.

Purple: The cross is draped with purple beginning on Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. The purple drape hangs for almost the entire duration of Lent. Represents both royalty and penitence

Black: \The cross is draped in black on Good Friday, representing the death of Christ on the cross for our sins.

White: The cross is draped in white on Easter Sunday representing purity and Christ's resurrection. It is on the cross for a week

Red: Red goes on for Pentecost, the 7th Sunday after Easter. Red symbolizes the color of fire to represent the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost and times when the work of the Holy Spirit is emphasized. This drape is on the cross for about a week.

Amazing Grace

In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace. Ephesians 1:7

t's hard to shake off a mother's influence. John Newton's earliest memories were of his godly mother who, despite fragile health, devoted herself to nurturing his soul. At her knee he memorized Bible passages and hymns. Though she died when he was about seven, he later recalled her tearful prayers for him.

After her death, John alternated between boarding school and the high seas, wanting to live a good life but nonetheless falling deeper and deeper into sin. Pressed into service with the British Navy, he deserted, was captured, and after two days of suspense, was flogged. His subsequent thoughts vacillated between murder and suicide. "I was capable of anything," he recalled.

More voyages, dangers, toils, and snares followed. It was a life unrivaled in fiction. Then, on the night of March 9, 1748, John, 23, was jolted awake by a brutal storm that descended too suddenly for the crew to foresee. The next day, in great peril, he cried to the Lord. He later wrote, "That tenth of March is a day much remembered by mc; and I have never suffered it to pass unnoticed since the year 1748—the Lord came from on high and delivered me out of deep waters."

The next several years saw slow, halting spiritual growth in John, but in the end he became one of the most powerful evangelical preachers in British history, a powerful foe of slavery, and the author of hundreds of hymns.

Here are some things you may not know about Newton's most famous hymn. His title for it wasn't originally "Amazing Grace" but "Faith's Review and Expectation." It is based in Newton's study of 1 Chronicles 17:16–17: "King David . . . said: 'Who am I, O Lord God? And what is my house, that You have brought me this far? And yet . . . You have also spoken of Your servant's house for a great while to come, and have regarded me according to the rank of a man of high degree "

And here's a nearly forgotten verse that Newton added near the end of "Amazing Grace." Try singing it for yourself:

The earth shall soon dissolve like snow, the sun forbear to shine; But God, Who called me here below, shall be forever mine.
