The Practice of Extravagant Generosity

It has been said that there are three things one should not talk about in polite company. They are, in no particular order: religion, money and politics. As a pastor I usually get a pass on the first and I can promise you that I will not talk about politics. So that

leaves money.

Money, wealth, resources, finances are all part of our daily lives. We keep budgets and look for sales in

> order to make our dollars go further. Jesus spoke frequently about money in the New Testament. He said, things like, "Do not accumulate for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal. But accumulate for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. (Mt 6:19-21). 6:24 "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.(Mt 6:24).

One of the names we call Jesus is LORD. LORD means the one who is in charge, the boss, the leader of our lives and the owner of all we have and that includes our money, wealth, and all our resources.

As those who are called by His name, we are called to a life of Extravagant Generosity which comes from our hearts. Jesus answers, "The most important is: 'Listen, Israel,



the Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is: 'Love your neighbor

as yourself." (Mk 12:29-31).

During the month of October we will explore just what it means to live a life of Extravagant Generosity. Extravagant Generosity is one of the Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations cited by Bishop Robert Schnase.

The Practice of Extravagant Generosity

Generosity describes the Christian's unselfish willingness to give in order to make a positive difference for the purposes of Christ. Congregations that practice *Extravagant Generosity* provide ministries that address our spiritual need to give in ways that exceed all expectations and extend to unexpected measures. Fruitful congregations thrive because of extraordinary sharing,

willing sacrifice, and joyous giving out of love for God and neighbor.

The PERSONAL Practice of Extravagant Generosity

Through the practice of *Extravagant Gener*osity, we offer our material resources in a manner that supports the causes that transform life and relieve suffering and that enlarge the soul and sustain the spirit. God uses our giving to reconfigure our interior lives and form us anew. We give back.

The series will be four weeks long, focusing each week on an different aspect our Extravagant Generosity

<u>Week I (Oct. 8—14):</u> Our Focus will be: "Ministry Flows From the Heart and is Made Possible by Your Generosity"

<u>Week II (Oct. 15—21):</u> Our Focus will be: "Relationships Are Matters Of The Heart"

Week III (Oct. 22-28): Our Focus will be: "If God Owns It All, Why Should I Give?"

Week IV (Oct. 29-Nov. 4): Our Focus will be: "God Is An Extravagant Giver"

<u>Week V (Nov. 5—11):</u> Extravagant Generosity Is An Expression Of Your Heart; An opportunity to respond to God's call to be extravagantly generous.

You will be receiving a letter in the coming week explaining more about this great opportunity to participate with God in His mission to bring the gospel to the whole world.

HEALTHY **CHURCH INITIATIVE (HCI)**

What is HCI?

The Healthy Church Initiative (HCI) is a process designed to transform churches. Our focus is on providing resources and strategies to church pastors, staff, laity, and congregations so they in turn will be able to connect people more meaningfully with Christ and become the church God wants them to be in their community.

There are three main components to this process:

1. Learning. 2. Consultation. 3. Coaching.

Learning

We believe that all church leaders (both pastors and laity) need to be in some form of continuous learning environment. The HCI process has leadership development sessions for pastors and laity to build a foundation of common understanding, motivations for change, and best practices. Each session includes elements such as: leadership training, congregational development, teaching, action plans, and spiritual development.

Consultation

Churches invite a team of trained consultants who visit their church to identify strengths and concerns and provide recommendations to address those areas of concern. These consultations involve elements such as: community study, analysis of key data, interviews with leaders, focus groups, congregational training, mystery guest worshipper visits, and more.

Coaching

Churches who accept the consultant recommendations are assigned a coach to work with them over a year to train their leaders and hold them accountable for completing the ministry plan. HCI cohort sessions provide mutual support for churches during the implementation process.

MISSION UPDATES

- Hurricane Isaac Recovery: While we are relieved that Isaac seems not as damaging as Katrina was, it still tore up homes, businesses, churches, and communities. This means that it is even more important for UMCOR and its ecumenical partners to help vulnerable people who aren't going to receive enough funds and public attention over the long haul. The greatest need is cleaning buckets. <u>Give to UMCOR</u> Advance #901670.
- <u>Mission Celebration in October</u>: Are you looking for resources to help you make a difference in the world? This October, with a click of your mouse, you can become an advocate for mission! On October 1, 10-Fold returns for a month-long celebration of five exciting projects, each highlighted for a full week.

Feed My Starving Children - On August 30th, six people left the church parking lot at 10:00 am to travel to Chanhassen to one of the warehouses of Feed My Starving Children. After checking in and getting our hair nets to wear, we watched a short presentation on the work of FMSC throughout the world. We were part of a group of about 20 people who were there for a 2 hour shift. We divided into 3 teams and were given instructions on how to measure the food going into the bags, how to weigh the bags, how to seal the bags, and how to pack the boxes. The three teams packed a total of 33 boxes. Each box had 36 bags of dehydrated food for a total of 1,188 bags. Each bag was enough to feed 4 people. So we packed 4,752 meals! We left with a great feeling, knowing that in our short time there, we were helping to feed the starving children.

<u>Celebrating Bread</u> <u>for Life– OCT. 7</u>

- As we celebrate Bread for the World in October, we are remembering those in our own country and around the world who struggle to get enough to eat. As we celebrate, we can rejoice that great progress has been made toward ending hunger. Millions more children are in school in Africa and other parts of the world. Lifesaving drugs and health clinics have halted the scourge of AIDS, malaria, and tuberculosis. New efforts to improve farming and nutrition in the world's poorest countries are beginning to enable hungry people to create a better future for their families and their communities.
- God is truly at work in the world, liberating hungry people, but too many people still go to bed hungry. Soaring food prices, especially for staples like corn or rice, and drought and famine have pushed millions of people to the brink of starvation.
- Right now Bread for the World is working hard to convince our elected officials to create a circle of protection around programs vital to hungry people in our own country and abroad. In this work they strengthened their partnership with UMCOR and other leaders from all major church bodies.
- Join us in celebrating Bread for the World as we renew our shared commitment to end hunger in God's world.

<u>NURSES NOTES</u> The Invisible Children

- How many children around us live with hunger, abuse, poor education, etc.? Guess we don't know. Why is that? As long as we and our families and friends are okay, we assume everyone else is making it. Too often, it is very comfortable to sit back and put up our feet and say, I've done enough. I'm too old, too young, too busy, too.... Too.... Is that what Jesus calls us to do? Guess not. We are called to search out these invisible children and their families.
- Recently, Anita Swift, Director of Migrant Head Start program, spoke at our UMW Meeting. It was moving to hear about 6week old babies to 3-year-old toddlers, mostly Spanishspeaking, going to a program that provides these kids with early education, nutritious meals, access to medical and dental exams, and immunizations. Right here in Waseca and surrounding towns; all being bussed to Elysian for school. Who knew? Bet lots of us didn't know.
- We need to look harder and be dedicated to serving the invisible people in our community. We don't have to go half-way around the world to find those in need.
- For the past several months, I've written about how to feel better. The real truth is, if you start doing for others, you will find a true fulfillment of your happiness and well-being. That is what God wants for us. Outrageous generosity of our love, talents, time and money.
- Let's together, go out and find those invisible children and their families and show them the love of Jesus Christ and His redeeming grace!

NEWS: KEYS TO A NEW FUTURE IN HAITI

- "This house will last all our lives," said Enolia Pierre, who sells coffee along the dusty road that leads to Mellier. The home she shared with here with three other adults and nine children was destroyed in the January 2012 earthquake that devastated Haiti and stole, according to the United Nations, more than 217,000 lives.
- Pierre was one of a dozen new homeowners who received their keys last week in a quiet celebration and blessing in one of the new, lemon-colored structures in Mellier, about an hour-and-a half drive from Portau-Prince.
- In all, 20 people here and 20 in the town of Carrefour, whose homes were irreparably damaged in the quake, will receive new houses. The homes are being built through the efforts of UMCOR, UMVIM and Eglise Methodiste d' Haiti.
- The homes are among 4 construction projects complete by UMCOR this month. Progress in construction and re-construction is only one part of the current moment in Haiti, which UMCOR's Melissa Crutchfield, head of international disaster response, called "pivotal."
- "There is a shift now in Haiti, from the emergency response phase to the long-term development phase," she said.
- Your gift to <u>Haiti Emergency, UMCOR Advance</u> <u>#418325</u>, will help UMCOR continue to walk with the Haitian people as they progress through recovery to development.
