EXTENDING A WARM MINNESOTA WELCOME...

Minnesota United Methodists are invited to welcome their new leader, Bishop Bruce Ough (pronounced Oh), at his installation service on Sept. 9, 3 p.m., at Woodbury/Peaceful Grove United Methodist Church, 7465 Steepleview Rd., Woodbury.

“We will welcome Bishop Ough to the new episcopal area—particularly the Minnesota Conference portion,” said Rev. David Bard, chairperson of the Minnesota Conference Episcopacy Committee. “This event will give Minnesotans a chance to get to know him a bit, and for him to get to know us.”

“We will also celebrate this new phase in ministry for the bishop and the conference.”

During the service, which includes communion, the bishop will preach and invite Minnesota United Methodists to covenant with him in Christ’s mission of bringing new life to our churches, communities, and the world. At a reception immediately following the service, people will have a chance to greet Bishop Ough and his wife, Charlene.

Bishop Ough, who begins his ministry in the Dakotas-Minnesota Area on Sept. 1, is the first experienced bishop sent to Minnesota Conference or Dakotas Conference after a long line of newly consecrated bishops.

“He brings experience,” Bard said. “He has passion for vital congregations and disciple-making. He has been a leader on the United Methodist Council of Bishops on thinking about how churches can be more vital.”

“Char and I are very excited about our assignment to the Dakota-Minnesota Area,” Bishop Ough said. “We are looking forward to the challenges and opportunities afforded by the creation of a new episcopal area within the United Methodist Church.

“I am delighted the Minnesota Conference is focused on the issues of spiritual vitality, leadership development, creating new places for new people, and transforming the world, particularly through the Imagine No Malaria campaign. These are areas upon which we can build to create more vital congregations in Minnesota. I look forward to joining and leading a conference and episcopal area committed to our mission of making new disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.”

Prior to his assignment to the Dakotas-Minnesota Area, Bishop Ough served the West Ohio Conference (2000-2012). At the time of his 2000 consecration as bishop, he was senior pastor of St. Paul’s United Methodist Church in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He has also served as a district superintendent in Iowa and as an adjunct faculty member of the University of Dubuque Theological Seminary. Bishop Ough grew up in North Dakota and is a 1973 graduate of North Dakota State University. He earned a master’s of divinity degree from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in 1978.

The Minnesota Conference and the Dakotas Conference become the Dakotas-Minnesota Episcopal Area with the arrival of Bishop Ough. The two conferences are not merging. They will share a bishop, much as two congregations share a pastor in a two-point charge. The two conferences will continue to be governed separately through separate annual conference sessions.

The Dakotas Conference has also scheduled welcoming events for Bishop Ough.

Bishop Sally Dyck, who served Minnesota from 2004 to 2012, has been assigned to the Northern Illinois Conference.

MISSION GIVING

There have been many requests for donations from the Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC). The MMDC is a supplier for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR).

The two most recent requests have been for flood buckets and school kits. The value of a flood bucket is \$55 and the value of a school kit is \$11. The list for these supplies can be found on top of the bookcase in the hallway in the file container. But a better way to give is through monetary donations where the money can be specified for flood buckets or school kits. MMDC can order supplies through their supplier and receive them at a reduced rate. Your monetary donations will then buy more than what you could have.

During the month of September, please donate to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center. In the memo line of your check or offering envelope, indicate MMDC and the money will be forwarded to them.

Let's try to reach a goal of 5 flood buckets (\$275 value) and 25 school kits (also \$275 value).

NURSES NOTES— “Give Me A Big Smile!”

A few months ago, one of our church members shared his reason for smiling—“It makes you feel better.” And he’s right! Smiling can lift your spirit. “A study conducted by the British Dental Health Foundation showed the act of smiling to dramatically improve one’s mood. Dr. Nigel Carter stated.” We have long been drawing attention to the fact that smiling increases happiness, both in yourself and those around you, so it is good to receive the backing of this scientific research. “A healthy smile can improve your confidence, help you make friends, and help you to succeed in your career.”

Smiling is also associated with reducing stress. Mark Stibich, PhD, consultant at Columbia University believes that, “If you can slow your breathing down and change your expression, you may be able to turn around the stress cascade.”

Endorphins, so-called “feel good hormones”, are released when you smile, or even fake smile

eon, crafts, baked goods, garden products, items for the silent auction and if you have something that fits in the category of 'almost new'.

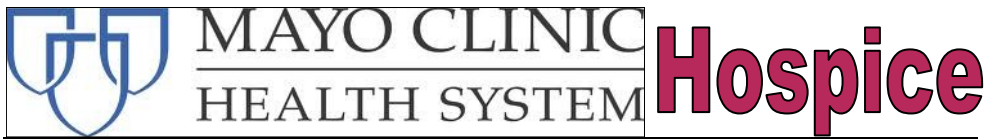

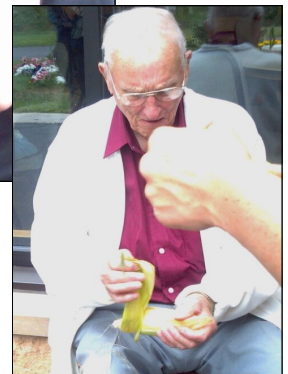
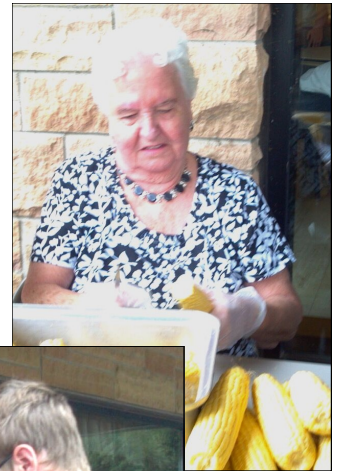

UMCOR Updates

NEWS: AIDING SYRIA'S DISPLACED

More and more Syrian people throughout their country are abandoning their homes as combat between the government and its opponents takes over the streets. It is reliably estimated that 1 in 20 Syrians is now internally displaced; roughly 1.5 million people. And the flow to neighboring countries shows no sign of diminishing.

UMCOR, the United Methodist Committee on Relief, is relying upon locally active humanitarian partners to channel the badly needed assistance as effectively as possible. Notable among these partners is the Turkey-based Muslim aid agency International Blue Crescent (IBC). IBC, in turn, collaborates closely with Syria's own Arab Red Crescent organization.

UMCOR also partners with International Orthodox Christian Charities, which not only relates to the Red Crescent and the Syrian relief group, Al-Nadah Association, but also links closely to the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Antioch and All the East (GOPA), which caters to Syria's minorities.

UMCOR's support is helping to bring food and other necessary items such as hygiene kits, bedding, and infants' supplies to displaced families flooding in from the provinces.

NEWS: OVERCOMING ADDICTION

If you think addiction is not an issue in your church, think again. **According to one study, one in four children under the age of 18 in the United States is exposed to alcohol abuse and dependence in the family.**

That's why UMCOR collaborates with the United Methodist Special Program on Substance Abuse and Related Violence, or SPSARV. The group provides resources for churches and individuals to help them avoid, recognize, and recover from addiction.

When pastors and congregations are educated

about the disease of addiction and the resources available, the church can be a place of true recovery.

NEWS: FIERCE FLOODING IN PHILIPPINES

A combination of typhoon and seasonal monsoon have brought torrential rains, storm surges and flooding in and around the Filipino capital, Manila, and surrounding provinces. Fifty-one people are known to have died in the storm that also chased tens of thousands from their homes.

Staff and volunteers of the Philippines office of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) travelled to affected areas to gauge the extent and impact of the flooding, but their efforts were often hindered by flooded roads.

They were able to reach residents of a fishing community, Nasugbu Batangas, and answer their call for help. A storm surge had struck the village, destroying homes and boats, which community members rely on for their livelihoods. About 200 families were affected.

In the meanwhile, "Please continue to pray for us and for the survivors of these floods."

CAN WE TALK? APPORTIONMENTS



Comedian Joan Rivers often used this phrase during her act. When she said this, it usually meant that she was about to make someone (her husband, for example) uncomfortable. I'm going to take this opportunity to channel Joan Rivers and ask if we can talk—about something you may find uncomfortable. I'd like to ask what would happen if we had conversations between and among churches that pay 100% of their apportionments and churches that don't or can't pay 100%.

If your church struggles to meet its financial commitments, including apportionments, what would you say to the churches that support the apportioned budget at or close to 100%? If your church commits to full participation and achieves it or comes close year after year, what would you say to those churches that don't? Without going into all the possible reasons, we know that some churches consistently participate at the 100% level and some churches do not. What would you say to one another or what would you ask each other if you had the opportunity?

I believe that the annual conference, through the Committee on Finance and Administration, the Budget Process Team, staff, and every committee and team, has been an excellent steward of the apportionments remitted to us and all the other giving we receive and process. Yet we seem to remain stuck at about an 85% receipt rate. We have reduced budgets or held them steady; tried a system of apportionment grants; CFA members met with individual churches; we

modified our apportionment formula; we increased communications through print and

electronic media; and we work every year to increase transparency and accountability of our financial systems and reports.

We have reduced staffing levels, frozen salaries, discontinued programs, and worked very hard to fund the key areas that will help us achieve our goals to reach out to new people and cultivate spiritual vitality.

I'm proud to tell the stories of our stewardship of gifts and of the ways lives are impacted by those gifts. And Minnesota's response to Imagine No Malaria amazes me every time I see the latest report of pledges and gifts received to date. Then I'm struck again by the contrast between this generosity and the level of apportionment participation.

Whether or not you consider any of the above list a success or failure—after all we don't know where we would be if we had not done these things—we still seem to be stuck.

What are we missing? What might we learn if we talked among ourselves? What would happen if we had conversations between and among churches? What if we have a conversation, no blame, no tales of woe, no attempt to design a better formula, just a conversation? If we are accountable to one another, not just to the Annual Conference or the CFA, but to each sister church, what would we learn if we talked to each other? It's my turn to ask you a question and my question is: can we talk?

Ceremony at Ness Church Promotes History and Healing

One-hundred fifty years ago, settlers buried the first five white casualties of the U.S.-Dakota war at Ness Church. This weekend, over 300 people came to Ness Church to take part in a commemoration ceremony. The Rev. Alan Kitto from the Santee Sioux Nation in Nebraska oversaw the Four Direction Song and A Wiping of the Tears ceremony. Secretary of State Mark Ritchie and State Representative Dean Urdahl also spoke.

The West Central Tribune, reports that "all of the speakers spoke of reconciliation and moving forward. They spoke of feeling the spirits of their ancestors in the place and of the need to heal the historical trauma of the war."
